JVC updates VHD/AHD player

A new version of its VHD/AHD (high-density video and audio) disc system was unveiled by JVC in the U.S. several months ago. JVC's disc player uses a mechanical-contact stylus to play two-sided, two-hour video discs; hardware might be marketed next year. An optional adapter can be plugged into JVC's player, enabling it to play pulse-code-modulation (PCM) audio discs with extraordinarily high fidelity. (Magnavox's Magnavision optical-disc machine being sold in a few cities has a non-contact laser beam for signal readout and plays back only TV signals.)

JVC's latest player differs from the hardware shown in Japan last year primarily in the method of loading discs. Instead of loading discs on the turntable like a conventional record player, you now slide a heavy plastic sleeve holding a disc into the machine. The disc is automatically loaded on the turntable when the sleeve is withdrawn, and removed when the disc jacket is reinserted.

This prevents smudging of the smooth-surface, grooveless disc, which, unlike some mechanical systems, can provide features like random access and still frame (available on Magnavision players). RCA modified its similar video-disc player for automatic loading after home tests showed smudging from handling was a serious problem. RCA's video-only system, however, has been based on discs with grooves, making the two systems incompatible. JVC, RCA, and other firms developing mechanical-type video-disc systems have been conducting talks, though, trying to establish a compatible standard. RCA has been buying software and gearing up for marketing its system, perhaps in 1980.

VIDEO-DISC PLAYERS

Several incompatible disc machines will tease the eager buyer next year.

If you're confused by ads citing advantages of one video-*tape* machine over an incompatible competitor, brace yourself. More befuddlement is brewing. Early next year, makers of two--and perhaps three--mutually incompatible video-*disc* players will each be shouting the virtues of their products while cleverly knocking the others.

Battle lines between two differing disc technologies took shape in the early 1970's with demonstrations of early lab prototypes. Despite attempts at standardization, the lines hardened for two types of disc players. Optical, involving touchless disc playback with a laser beam, and mechanical systems, requiring contact between the disc and pickup stylus.

Proponents of the mechanical system point out the basic simplicity of their approach and its low costs for mass marketing. Those favoring optical systems stress the no-wear advantages of laser-beam playback. (Lasers last over 10,000 hours.) Proponents of the optical route also say that mass production of optics and a switch to solidstate lasers will cut prices.

Pictures I've seen from the newest Pioneer, Magnavox, and RCA players are all amazingly detailed and noise-free. What follows should help delineate the differences between these players.

Optical machines: laser playback

Two optical video-disc players, made by Japan's Universal Pioneer Corp. and by Magnavox here, are being test-marketed in a limited number of cities. Magnavox plans nationwide sales this year, Pioneer next year. The machines play compatible 12-inch discs by bouncing a focused laser beam from a spiral track of microscopic pits etched on the disc's reflective surface. A clear plastic coating makes the disc immune to dust and smudges from handling. Two types of discs are sold: Those with a half hour per side of programming play at 1800 rpm. Player controls enable you to freeze a TV picture, quickly scan a disc, play forward and reverse slow motion, or pick a specific TV frame by displaying its number on the screen. Pioneer's VP-1000 player and remote control have a numbered key pad for direct framenumber selection; Magnavox's Magnavision requires scanning to the desired frame. Hour-per-side discs have more than one TV frame on each circular track, so freeze-frame and related features will not work. (Playback rpm gradually changes from inner to outer tracks.) Both players have output jacks for optional stereo hi-fi (or duallanguage tracks). Pioneer Artists Inc. and other new software firms will provide a stream of stereo/video music performances. Also, movie makers plan to release films to theaters and for discs almost simultaneously. Discs cost from \$6 to \$25. Both players, with minor variations, have laser-based optics to play discs standardized by Philips and MCA. A beam from a laser is deflected by a prism and mirrors through a lens onto the disc. Metal between pits flashes light back to a photodetector for conversion to an electronic TV signal. The entire mechanism moves radially on a slide linked to the electronic servo circuits that control its movement.

RCA: grooved capacitance disc

RCA's SelectaVision video-disc player has been completely overhauled since it was introduced and field-tested several years ago. The basic playback principle is unchanged: A stylus electrode, replaced every two or three years, senses the TV signal as electrical capacitance variations in disc grooves spinning at 450 rpm. Playing time was boosted to one hour per 12-inch disc side by doubling disc grooves to just under 10,000 per inch. Home tests showed that dust and other groove contaminants from handling messed up pictures. So, RCA's

improved SelectaVision has sealed disc "caddies." Slip the caddy into a player slot and the disc is loaded automatically. This contactfree, sealed-player approach sharply reduces groove contamination. Spiral grooves, with four TV frames per revolution, do not permit freeze-frame and similar features now. These operating features may go into future step-up models using electronic memories to store images. Two fast-search buttons, though, let you jump the stylus forward or back to quickly locate a scene visually. Also, two other search buttons move the tone arm and display its position as time on digital readouts. RCA does not plan to include stereo hi-fi capability on its initial model, slated for nationwide marketing early next year. The player's simple construction, plus many microcircuits, should keep RCA's price under \$500. Discs will be \$15 to \$20, depending on content. RCA's low-cost approach has gained powerful allies: Zenith and undoubtedly other TV firms will market or make Selecta-Visions. CBS Inc. will help expand disc titles from 150 to 300 in the first year. Programs from several film companies range from classics, musicals, current films, and how-to, to TV series such as "Star Trek" (10 episodes) and "Victory at Sea" (a 90-minute version), and "Heidi" and "Hans Brinker" for children.

JVC: grooveless capacitance disc

Victor Company of Japan (or JVC here) rolled out a disc system in 1978 that combines the low-cost aspects of SelectaVision with the operating options--freeze-frame, slow-motion, etc.--of optical machines. Not only that, JVC included options for a super-hi-fi audio disc. It calls the whole package its VHD/AHD system (video and audio high density). Matsushita, Victor's parent firm in Japan, could offer VHD/AHD through its Panasonic and Quasar subsidiaries. An announcement about marketing is expected this summer. VHD/AHD hour-per-side discs are just over 10 inches in diameter and rotate at 900 rpm. Signals are stored as capacitance variations, produced by minute pits in the conductive plastic. The stylus rests over several spiral tracks, distributing pressure and minimzing wear. (Stylus life is 2000 hours, roughly 10 times RCA's.) But the metal stylus electrode "reads" just one information track and the tracking signals on either side of it. These tracking signals keep the stylus on the right path by feeding current to a coil/magnet combination on the arm, which can move sideways. The cantilever arm can also be stretched or shortened instantly to correct for speed variations (time-base errors). Signals sent to coils can be used to make the stylus replay one frame continuously, move ahead or back at slow speed, etc. JVC has also demonstrated an optional random-access unit with a wireless remote control for the main VHD/AHD player. It has memories and numbered key pads for preprogrammed display of selected TV frames. Another plug-in option unscrambles digitally coded audio discs that have a dynamic range over 90 dB and other super-fidelity specifications. At this writing, JVC has not revealed video software sources needed to sell its system successfully. Europe's Thorn-EMI Ltd., though, has agreed to produce both players and software.

For the past year, I've been trying to find original, unused rubber belts for Toshiba, Hitachi, and Sanyo players to take precise measurements off. This would be for the "CED Player Belt Replacement Guide" I'm working on. These don't appear to be available anywhere, so I may have to finish the guide based on approximations. But the good news is that most of the belts were off-the-shelf designs, so it's just a matter of getting a substitute belt close enough to the original to work.

Regarding the Toshiba Turntable Drive Belt (also used in the Wards and Elmo OEM knockoffs), if the belt is merely falling off, it may simply be installed insideout. The turntable motor pulley in the Toshiba player is unflanged, and at first thought one might wonder how the belt ever stays on it at all. What keeps it in place is the natural "curl" of the flat rubber belt where the belt has a tendency when pinched to curl in one direction or the other. Toshiba put a white mark on the outside of their belts, so the belt should be installed with this facing out. If the belt is broken or stretched to the point that it no longer fits, then a belt close in size to the original will work. The drive path in the Toshiba player is 31" and design convention dictates a belt 5 to 10% smaller in circumference. Therefore a flat rubber belt 28" to 30" in circumference with a width of 0.3125" should work. The width is important, since narrower belts may not have enough curl to keep them on the motor pulley. You may be able to find a local supplier for this size belt by checking in the phone directory under "Electronic Equipment- Service & Repair".

General Electric. GE announced just before the electronics show [CES in Chicago - ed.] that it's discussing a joint venture with Japan's Matsushita and JVC and England's Thorn EMI Ltd. to market the VHD (video high density) disc system and its software (programming). The VHD system was demonstrated at the Consumer Electronics Show by Panasonic and JVC, both Matsushita subsidiaries. The giant Japanese firm says it may have VHD players on the market by late 1981. They would be priced to compete with RCA's under-\$500 SelectaVision disc palyer, slated for introduction early in 1981. RCA recently dubbed its system CED, for Capacitance Electronic Disc; it will also be sold by Sears Roebuck.

Both the CED and VHD systems sense TV signals encoded as capacitance variations in discs when a stylus contacts the disc surface. But discs for one system are not compatible with the other. Magnavox and Pioneer both expect to market their optical systems (\$700-\$750) nationwide next year, too. Optical discs, played back by a laser beam, are compatible between the Pioneer and Magnavox players.

Hello:

There was recently a thread where someone believing the RCA SelectaVision VideoDisc was the first VideoDisc format was corrected by some subsequent posts indicating the LaserDisc predated it by a few years. Well, the first VideoDisc format was actually John Logie Baird's Phonovision, first produced in 1927 and commercially sold in a modified form in Great Britain during the early 1930's. After a long period of VideoDisc inactivity, the A.E.G. Telefunken Teldec system was publicly demonstrated in June 1970, and commercially sold in Germany for about a year starting in April 1975. An article on Teldec appears in the January 1971 issue of _Popular Science_.

In response to the question, What was the first stereo VideoDisc? There actually wasn't a single disc, as RCA simultaneously introduced eight stereo titles along with the SGT200 and SGT250 players in May 1982. Those initial eight titles were:

Popeye* Jazz Singer, The [1980]** Pink Floyd at Pompeii* Pippin* Paul Simon In Concert* Rod Stewart: Live at the Los Angeles Forum* Eubie!* Paul McCartney & Wings Rockshow*

The above titles are listed in stock number order, which may or may not reflect the order in which they were pressed at the factory. The first two titles are movies with the stock number starting with 10, while the last six are musical performances with the stock number starting with 12. The CED title "The Kids are Alright" was an early stereo title, but wasn't released until a couple months after the above in July 1982.

Another question that comes up is, What was the first ever VideoDisc? Like the above, there were a number of titles available for purchase at the CED launch in March 1981, as RCA had spent most of 1980 and early 1981 pressing a warehouse full of discs for the nationwide launch. But according to the publication _RCA Engineer_ the first production title mastered was "Race for Your Life, Charlie Brown", which curiously enough isn't even close to having the lowest numerical stock number. If you look at this title, you may notice the rainbow-style label pattern. Other titles with this rainbow pattern like "The Love Bug" and "The Philadelphia Story" may be among the first titles pressed, as this would make sense from a manufacturing standpoint.

A manager who was still working at the pressing plant when it closed on June 27, 1986 told me the last title released was "Jewel of the Nile". Several of these were framed for distribution among the management staff with the legend "This Last RCA VideoDisc Produced Is Dedicated To 1986" . This is the only 1986 title I've seen that isn't listed on any of RCA's impending release bulletins, so the decision to press it must have been a last minute thing. It doesn't seem to be an extremely rare title, which is odd, because how did people become aware of its existence to buy it? Perhaps RCA sent out an announcement to their dealer network stating this was the final title available. The ones I've seen also have two labels glued directly over each other on the caddy, so RCA must have been gathering up all their miscellaneous caddies when this was pressed.

whether some media was shortened to get it on a single disc. RCA actually raised the 60 minute limit per side to 63 minutes in 1983 after the introduction of the J-series players. Some long discs will enter locked groove around 61 minutes on the early players designed before this longer play time was instituted. The test discs have 65 minutes of video per side to test arm travel limit, and the longest side I've seen on a released title is Side 2 of "My Dinner with Andre" where the movie ends at 55:51 followed by the trailers for "Koyaanisqatsi" and several other movies until it finally ends at 62:12. Elimination of end credits and time compression were two methods used to get movies longer than 120 minutes on a single disc. Examples of time compression are "Star Wars" and "The Empire Strikes Back" which were respectively shortened by 3 minutes and 5 minutes by speeding up the 1" recording tape during mastering. I'm not aware of any discs with cut scenes, but haven't investigated whether this is the case with "Raiders of the Lost Ark" or any other titles.

I know that an early practice with both CED and laserdiscs, and even a few tapes, was to "time-compress" movies that ran slightly over the alloted time, 2 hours in discs' case. This meant the movie was run at a slightly faster speed, "Star Wars" runs about 121 minutes so the CED and first laserdisc versions were done this way, the letterbox reissue on laserdisc is on 2 discs so it won't be time compressed. Empire Strikes Back is very obviously time-compressed, you can tell just by the opening music! I have heard a few movies were slightly edited to fit on one disc, usually brief scenes where nothing really happens, like when they show someone getting out of a car or walking into a room. They told me they did this with "Saturday Night Fever" but I haven't run my tape along with it to see if this is true or not (I also have the laserdisc which has the end of the credits shortened!) The most recent letterboxed laserdisc of Raiders of the Lost Ark is a single disc, and my old tape is on a T-120 so I don't think it ever ran over 2 hours. I read somewhere the original VHS tape of Superman: The Movie was horribly time-compressed to fit on the longest available tape at the time, that must have been something to see! I also heard that the first Thorn/EMI VHS tape of The Terminator was time-compressed to fit onto a T-105 length tape, I don't know if this is true either. Thankfully video companies have seemed to stop this deplorable practice, especially since laserdisc started being marketed as the "purist" format. I think HBO still does this to fit movies into even-amounted time slots however, but they do so much stuff with their movies now that there's simply no point in subscribing to them at all. Opening credits on a lot of old videos were letterboxed to fit onto the screen, and had often interesting borders. Besides the orange on Up in Smoke, 3 Days Of The Condor has a funny 70's line design, The Dark Crystal has a weird medival pattern, and others have other colored borders. Again, thankfully almost every current laserdisc release is entirely in letterbox format, I often watch my old CEDs JUST to watch how bad the pan and scan is!

I've never worn out a needle (but fear the day I do), I've tested a few that produce a snowy picture however so this is probably what happens. I

have however had 2 stylus cartridges short out on me, once on my Sears/Hitachi player which uses the funny long thin cartridges, and once on my SGT 250, which uses the more common large cartridges, this was when I was watching for the first time a disc I had gotten new in the shrinkwrap! Both times, the sound and picture appeared to "freeze" for a second (more often experienced on old early-80's laserdiscs, the sound effect is also similar to a CD stuck on one part, repeating the same fraction of a second over and over.) After this the sound and picture dropped out entirely into a series of white horizontal lines on the screen. I often hit Pause for a second when strange problems come up and that seems to cure it, but these times the player would not do anything else after I tried to return to play mode, playing other discs brought nothing.

New question: Does anyone know of any program material that is available ONLY on CED? Besides the opening RCA logos, and instore demos, I have a few discs that I haven't seen on any other formats. The NFL highlight discs are actually each composed of 4 separate films that look like they were distributed on 16mm film. I just got the Wimbledon 79/80 disc this week, and that also appears to be taken from different 16mm films (I haven't watched all of it yet.) I don't think the 1980 Olympics "Miracle of Lake Placid" disc is available anywhere else either. One of my favorite CEDs, and among the first load I ever picked up, is Family Entertainment Playhouse, which is 4 Learning Corporation of America 16mm films shown in schools telling "stories with a message". The "Mr. Gimme" film is especially hilarious! I have an animated Hansel and Gretel full-length movie done with animated figures, made in the 1950's and put on disc by RCA, which I have not even seen listed in any video movie guides, so this film may be pretty rare too. The MysteryDisc interactive discs were originally produced for laserdisc, but "A Week At The Races" was made for CED (I like how the old guy on it says the word "videodisc"). Although Jane Fonda's Workout started as an RCA Videodiscs production, it's still available on VHS, and I have seen Dr. Spock's "Caring for your Newborn" on VHS as well.

One final note, I just saw a DVD player at the Good Guys yesterday, all they had was a Panasonic demo disc, there aren't any movies out for it yet. The claims of "Superior to laserdisc" are as false as the first RCA promo's claim of it having "clear, beautiful pictures." The demo disc includes a slow camera pan across the front of the player, with shadows on it that have that awful "pixelated" appearance that has plagued every other digital video format I've seen. It doesn't look as awful as DSS but it is still completely unacceptable and I will never give up my laserdiscs for it. I do look forward to DVD's becoming an even bigger failure than CED, then I can get a \$10 DVD player at a thrift store and watch the demo disc at home and laugh at it all the time.

A recent question concerned "Why does the turntable in my SKT400 spin down at variable rates?" This response addresses turntable spin down in general. Since the turntable has to go from 450rpm to a complete stop in a few seconds, a braking mechanism is employed. In all belt-driven turntables this is a

mechanical friction system, and in all direct drive turntables (except the Sanyo VDR3000), braking is achieved by reversal of the drive coil magnetic fields. Failure of the turntable to spin down in a timely fashion could be due to a weak mechanical friction system, or in the case of reversed coil braking, could be due to increased friction in the turntable mechanism. At first though this seems contradictory, since increased friction halts motion more rapidly, but remember that increased friction also generates more heat, and heat destroys magnetic fields. While a disc is being played, the Hall Effect transducers near the magnetic ring on the turntable create feedback that forces the mechanism to spin the turntable at 450rpm. If there is excessive friction, the magnetic coils draw more current to maintain the rate, which in turn produces more heat, requiring even more current, etc. At the end of play, this excessive heat causes the spin down phase to take longer.

Here are areas to look at to eliminate excess friction: (1) Turntable height-- needs to be high enough so there is no friction with the surrounding base.

(2) Turntable warpage-- Never hit a CED player while the turntable is spinning. The turntable is very susceptible to damage from the impact while its spinning. The reason I mention this is that I've seen CED players (and computer hard drives, for that matter) that won't spin up unless first given a tap. In the case of CED players this "stiction" condition is often caused by a turntable shaft that was mistakenly greased (see item 4).

(3) Missing Thrust Plate-- J and K players have a small 1/4" plate under the turntable shaft that is often missing. Sometimes a missing plate can be found attached to the turntable magnetic ring, since it fell out during a previous turntable removal and was drawn to the ring.

(4) No Lubrication-- The turntable shaft should be lightly lubricated with sewing machine oil. Avoid using motor oils (too thick and detergent content), as well as 3-In-1 Oil (vegetable oil content).

Even in the absence of excessive friction, the rate at which the turntable spins down varies slightly each time the reject or unload button is pushed. This is because coil reversal can be initiated in any one of four states depending upon the particular instant the button is pushed. It's preferable to allow the player to initiate the reject sequence at the end of play, but in any case, the raised outer rim of the disc protects the grooves, and with Hitachi players, the small diameter turntable only contacts the raised center section of the disc.

I have the instruction manual (only) for an RCA CED player identified as the SGT101. As best I can tell it's identical to the SGT100, but page

14 (where the warranty would appear) is entirely blank, even though page 12 refers to "...page 14 for information regarding warranty coverage.) RCA has long been known to make special models for distribution in different channels, so I don't know whether this player was intended for a particular store chain or for non-retail distribution.

(The way I got this manual was unusual -- an RCA rep gave several copies to a regular dealer, who set them out mistakenly thinking they were brochures. The booklet does *not* say "instruction manual" or the like on the cover, so that was an easy mistake, but I can't figure out how quantities of this booklet ended up being sent out to the sales force.)

Okay, so like I got this Return of the Jedi on CED (both parts). Part 2 plays great, however the same cannot be said for the first disc. When I took the disc out to inspect it, I noticed FINGERPRINTS on the surface of the disc, both sides. Well, so much for that, I thought.

Well, after noticing messages on here from people cleaning discs, I decided to do the same, using liquid hand soap, and using some foam swabs (used for cleaning tape heads. Then I decided to take the deal a step further...since the discs originally were sprayed with silicone (to reduce wear), I bought a can of aerosol silicon spray lubricant (valvoline brand) and sprayed the surface of the disc. WHOOPS! It comes out pretty thick. <grin> Anyways, I wiped the surface of the disc down (with a less than lint free cloth) and played the disc. It skipped a lot. Took it back out of the jacket, yep, lots of fibers from where I wiped it...plus there was still a lot of lubricant on the disc. So, I took the disc to the bathtub and turned the cold water on fairly hard, figured I could just spray the fibers off. That got rid of some of the contamination. Anyways, subsequent plays show that the picture is improving, it skips less than when I started, and the silicone spray has no ill effects on the program material.

I think where I went wrong was using a non lint-free cloth. I think that perhaps using a chamois would be a better idea...

Just thought you guys would like to know about the silicone spray thing. :)

So I have this CED player (SJT200) that makes a lot of noise while it's playing, and I can look with the top cover off and see the platter that the disc sits on is wobbling something fierce. It's like it's out of balance, but it *looks* more like it really is wobbling that is, relative to the stylus, the disc is moving up and down very quickly as it passes by, as if the shaft of the platter were too small for the hole in which it sits. Overall, the discs I have play okay, usually with a brief A/V glitch every minute or so, and sometimes the noise the player makes evens out, and becomes quiet for a few minutes, then will go right back to being real noisy.

older movies, both CED and laserdisc, that they ended sides at the end of
reels in the theatrical prints. Old transfers show the changeover marks;
most new ones don't anymore. That's why "Rustler's Rhapsody" has a really

bad side break (someone asks a question at the end of side 1 and the

other guy answers at the beginning of side 2!) but it's still OK to me since that's where the reel ended. Movies on the Vestron label are really amusing because they always tried to cram as much as they could on side 1, sometimes they didn't even stop at the end of the reel, just took it as long as they could til the end of the side, the time counter often reaches 60 on these before it ends. This gives really short sides to short movies; I have The Lenny Bruce Performance Film and "The Magic Pony," both of which are under 75 minutes, so side 2 of these runs under 15 minutes! It's funny to look at the surfaces of these discs and see how little space was used. I have "Tempest" and "Never Say Never Again" which are 2-disc sets of movies that ran just slightly over 2 hours, and side 3 of these is also very short. Most discs seem to spread over sides more evenly, but these are exceptions! BTW, why didn't they make a special "Turn Disc Over" type of message for unused sides, like side 4 of a 3-sided movie for example? Considering the market CED was intended for it seems it would have been ideal, rather than just having an "End" code immediately at the start of the side, I bet this caused a lot of people to think their players were broken! Laserdiscs always have interesting stuff on their unused sides, the funniest is the upside-down turtle, others have generic printed messages saying "Program Material is recorded only on the other side of this

disc." Since my laserdisc player is autoreverse, these sides come up by themselves after the end of the movie, and for some strange reason I always let them play through before putting the disc away!

This issue has a couple of topics that bring back some memories.

Regarding the breaks. My recollection is that there was great emphasis on getting as much programming on one side as possible, regardless of the "wierdness" of the break. We all had players and as you might imagine we had a plethora of titles. As a matter of fact, we usually got a stack of discs a day from DISC Manufacturing. Anyway, we always complained about the breaks to no avail as the Mastering Process was very time consuming and expensive. To redo the master was not possible as the emphasis was on getting titles available and not necessarily making the breaks look good. Also as I recall the Mastering was done essentially by engineering and not by a more esthethiclly aware group. Again the emphasis was on getting as much on the disc as possible.

It was a perception at RCA that one of the disadvantages with VideoDisc, CED and LD, was that the programming on a side was a disadvantage. Also, it was thought that to put as much material on one side, regardless of the total time of the programming, was important to maximize the "time to flip" for the customer. In my opinion, esthetics should have been used first.

Also, the limited playback time per side was an issue for RCA. The Star Wars CED pushed the limit for programming by having more than one hour on a side. By the way I recall finding the hanging dice in the Millenium Falcon during one of my system evaluations. Everyone thought it was pretty cool. Video players did not do freeze frame very well back then. The parody "Hardware Wars" showed the dice, highly magnified of course, and low and behold there they were in the real movie only for one scene.

It was also interesting about the many comparisons that were made between CED and LD especially the technical ones. It was surprising to us that LD had "skips" just like CED. It was a preception then that the LD should not have had the problem since it was not a mechnaical pickup like CED. We also thought that there was more robust signal processing on the front end than we had. Not the case. Their skip problems were, in our opinion greater than ours. Also their recovery mechanism was very poor. Many times the LD would not recover. The CED players have a "kicker" circuit so that if there is a skip or a locked groove the uProcessor would kick the stylus to a groove that was clear. The DAXI code was used to determine the location of the stylus. Recall that there are (I hope I get this right) four frames or eight fields per groove. Each field has a unique DAXI code that is sequential to the previous one. If you take a disc out of a jacket and look at the pattern , you will see areas that are identical. This is the NTSC vertical interval. If you have a very bad disc, try making a clock out of it. very cool looking. Rather large though.

Next was the delamination of the LD's. This was a major problem for LD's and there were many recalls of titles. LD's were produces as two separate discs and then laminated together. A process that was never fully perfected until later. As you might recall the number of LD's was greatly reduced after the demise of CED.

Well sorry for all the ramblings, but you seem like a group that might appreciate the info and it is fun recalling a really exciting, stimulating and rewarding time in my engineering career.

>This is something that really scared me about DVD...I heard that they were >using MPEG for compressing the video early on. After working in AV&C >(a Tandy Brand store), the artifacting really got to me. Seems my fears >are confirmed. :)

There is nothing wrong with MPEG per se. It can meet broadcast specifications IF you want it too.

MPEG-I is pretty attrocious at it's best.

MPEG-2 can be good if you let it. It's the problem of varying levels of compression that are chosen that can make it pretty bad.

However since the DVD is being pushed to the consumer market and the LD is held as an 'elitist' format - I wouldn't be surprised if the 'bean counter' mentality holds and higher compression is used to get more time per disk.

There have been 6 video disk formats so far in this century.

None has made an impact as much as the current laser disk. We will just have to wait and see if it will stick around.

There are far more technologies looking for a market, than markets looking for a technology. That is shown by the raging success of DCC and MD :- :- :-

I bought a CED player the first week they were out. I had waited a year for an LD previously and finally cancelled that. When the RCA was released it had more titles in the catalog than the LDs did.

After two weeks it went back. Four out of the first six disks had to be returned because of skipping. Exchange after exchange - until the dealer and I decided it was time to forget all this foolishness.

The 100 probably never should have left the labs.

The 400 series was a quite a different animal. IF that had been the first machine RCA had released the format may have had a chance. Gone was the weave and faint diagonals lines (if you knew what to look for) that identified the picture as CED. The direct drive instead of belts helped that.

Until I see something better I'll stick with my LDs (and my CED's for nostalgia purposed) and my ED-Beta. Too bad the LD's can't match the EDs performance. I think we'll have to wait for HDTV for that.

Jesse Skeen wrote:

"Regarding the comment about side breaks, I've noticed on a lot of the older movies, both CED and laserdisc, that they ended sides at the end of reels in the theatrical prints. Old transfers show the changeover marks; most new ones don't anymore."

That's because the older transfers were often made from prints, usually made on low-contrast film, that in those days were handled by the lab in

the same way as theatrical prints. This included adding change marks, unless the studio advised otherwise, because the networks and local stations often used the change marks in the same way that a theater projectionist would. It also meant that the print was a third- or fourth-generation element, just as a theatrical print.

Nowadays most theatrical films are transferred from a second-generation element, meaning an interpositive, a "lo-con" print or a reversal internegative, that was made directly from "The Negative" specifically for video transfer use. (I call it "The Negative" because the best existing film is referred to that way, even though it may not necessarily be the same piece of film that went through the camera. For "Snow White," for example, this term refers to the color negative that was generated on the Cineon system a few years ago, not the RGB negative that was originally shot.) Not only does this greatly reduce generation losses, but there is no need for change marks. (Programs and commercials shot on film for TV are normally transferred directly from the camera negative and then edited on tape. Feature films can transferred directly as well, but they usually aren't due to the risks involved in taking "The Negative" out of the storage facility for a few days for the transfer.)

Getting back to CED, a guy I know in Hollywood transferred the "rings" animation (for RCA's stereo discs) and some other stuff for RCA SelectaVision back then, and he told me that they were *very* fussy about picture and sound quality. RCA was having its transfers done on the Rank Cintel Mark III flying-spot scanner at a time (only a few years after the Mark III was first adapted for NTSC) when some studios were still doing transfers for home video on older Plumbicon-based film camera chain systems.

Tom,

I have to vent a little about this DVD bashing here. Suffice it to say, I'm one of the few people in the world with a CED, Laserdisc and DVD players in my home theater setup.

Let's address the major factual errors:

A. Pixellation. Yes, some of the demo discs suffered from a touch of it because they hadn't figured how to encode the discs properly. And yes, some of the titles in current release, particularly the Warner Home Video titles, have it in spots because of compression needs. WHV still isn't making dual-layer discs, which gets them in trouble if they need to go over 133 minutes. Check out any of the dual-layer MGM or New Line releases and I doubt you'll see much pixellation if any. Just like laserdisc, and CED for that matter, it depends on who makes the disc.

B: Lines of resolution. Peak 500, real world about 425. Twice that of VHS, and more than CED or laserdisc. You can tell the difference on a 700-line TV.

C: Companies paying off the press: Yeah, right. We as a group have been trashing DVD for 18 months, and generally are as surprised as anyone that it actually works, and that people are buying it in surprising numbers. If a format sucks, we say it does. That's why MD and DCC haven't ever sold.

Sorry if this seems a little grouchy. I'm fond of my CED, wrote a cute story comparing it and DVD last year, and I've begun collecting titles. But I'm also not anchored in the past and I can embrace new technology.

May marks the 15th anniversary of RCA's stereo VideoDisc players. Here is an excerpt from the G&M DiscNews Newsletter making the announcement:

"The big news this month are RCA's two new stereo disc players. Along with the new stereo videodiscs, and hooked up to both your TV and a stereo system, the experience is almost beyond description. RCA's stereo system also incorporates the CBS CX noise reduction system, which increases dynamic range while decreasing noise levels. There are 8 stereo discs available now, with perhaps 20-30 available by year's end. Both of the new players feature video and stereo audio output jacks, so connection direct to a video monitor is possible. Also, all the function control buttons are now solenoid operated. And a special switch lets one play binaural discs, switching between L and R side information. The SGT200 is almost identical to the current SFT100, at \$349. The new SGT250, however, is the pride and joy of the line. It has automatic loading, and wireless remote control. It costs just \$399."

G&M was a family-run mail order supplier of CED's for the entire CED production era. This is the earliest DiscNews newsletter I've been able to obtain, so if anybody else has these, I need all the 1981 and early 1982 editions, as well as the March/April 1986 edition. G&M closed a few years after the last CED's were released when the founder went into retirement. His son, who was editor of DiscNews, is now a well-known author of computer "how to" books. I tried to get DiscNews copies from them, but everything was disposed of when the business closed.

Actually, the skips from early MCA DiscoVision discs were due to the combination of player and disc. The Magnavox Magnavision VH-8000 (and 8005) players could only track near perfect discs, and thus did not do well with the majority of software comming out of MCA's Carson main production and Costa Mesa Pilot Plant. The introduction of Pioneer's VP-1000 for Christmas 1980, pretty much eliminated all skipping except in the case of VERY defective discs. Since MCA DiscoVision was pressing discs on what were (slightly modified) conventional LP record presses, and were NOT using clean room conditions (clean rooms at DiscoVision did not happen until IBM came on board), the tracks of the discs would end up out of spec. Even a track that is slightly out of spec will cause the disc to LaserLock or skip. Pioneer incorporated additional lens movement capability into thier VP-1000 to handle the out of spec tracks...this lead to Philips lodging an official complaint with MCA charging collusion between Pioneer and DiscoVision and with hiding the problems from Philips.

With the opening of Pioneer's Kofu plant in Japan, and the truly clean room conditions, skipping and laser lock were a thing of the past.

I bought my first LD player X-Mas 81 (a Pioneer LD-1100) and the skipping problem, even with DiscoVision titles was MUCH less severe than CED's. I got my (SGT-250) CED player Jan 83, and was horrified by the skips. It was so bad that I stopped buying CED discs alltogether, and wasn't until the release of the SJT-400 that I started buying again. (and while that player was MUCH, MUCH better, it still would skip 100% more than LD) Plus, you didn't have to worry about skipping increasing with time on a LaserDisc (unless you scratched it horribly) as you did with a CED.

A process that was never fully perfected until later. As you might recall the number of LD's was greatly reduced after the demise of CED.<<

Actually, DiscoVision titles had no problems with LaserRot (Delamination), which is caused by the glue bonding the two sides together eating through the aluminum coating. If a DiscoVision title made it to the store in good condition, it would stay that way (I have over 200 MCA DiscoVision titles and have NEVER had one rot...if it's good, it stays good). DiscoVision's problem was inclusion (dust, insects, etc..trapped beneath the plastic of the disc) caused my the non-clean room enviroment, and discs that didn't meet the MCA/Philips spec; and the Magnavox players of the time. Pioneer DID have a major problem with LaserRot, in both the American and

Japan plant. It was eventually traced to an impurity in the water used to mix the bonding glue. Pioneer DID issue a recall of titles in '86 or so, but it had nothing to do with the demise of CED...in fact, most of the titles were eventually repressed. (except for titles made by the horrid, and now, thankfuly out of business, Technidisc) We can thank RCA for starting the practice of using high quality, lowcon negatives for all transfers. DiscoVision was the first to use a Rank Cintel Mark III flying-spot scanner, but it was RCA who insisted on negatives instead of prints for the best video quality. I remember how stunning the Star Wars CED transfer was. It looked better than the LD since RCA routinely redid transfers for VideoDisc release. (I have a single-sided, floppy, test LaserDisc pressing by MCA DiscoVision from 1975, of High Planes Drifter, and it was transfered using a conventional film chain. While the disc plays fine on todays players, the transfer shows just how big an advance the Rank truly was)

One last thing...in regards to pricing...I love CED and all, but it bugs me when people say CED VideoDiscs were the first low cost titles on home video. Not true. MCA DiscoVision's original list prices (1978-79) were \$5.95, \$9.95 and \$15.95 per title (for boxed, multi-disc sets!)...can't get much cheaper than that!

upon the DAXI code in the vertical interval. The LaserVision unit of course was optical and sensitive to depth of field issues while the CED being a mechanical process was seneitive to particulates, etc. The caddy was responsible for protecting the disc during handling as well as loading of the disc.

The production process used for the discs was identical to that used for the old 33 audio discs. Basically, a "puck" was formed by the loaded plastic and placed into the press. Under a lot of heat and pressure the puck was formed into the disc, the flash cut off the edges and the disc placed upon the spindle. This was all done automatically without humans touching the disc. The stack of discs (all the same title) were then sent to a holding area where a sample was taken and played upon a realtime tester. I designed all the circuits for the data acquisition portion of the tester.

The area that was used for pressing the discs was not at a clean room level. As I recall it was either class 10,000 or 1,000 environment. Not much cleaner than a typical home. Handling was the biggest issue with CED as well as setting the press operating parameters. Low production costs were a big issue and a modification of the vinyl process used at RCA records on 30th Street should have been effective in the long run.

The J line players were refered to as the "features player". These units had many operational features. Most of you are probably aware. At the same time that development was underway on this product, RCA and Hitachi were developing a digital control bus for controlling TV's, stereos, videodisc, AM/FM receivers, etc. The negotiations for the standards were going slower than we in player engineering and engineers at the labs wanted so I suggested an alternative. I believe it was included in the release. The standard was called MAV which stood for Multiple Audio Video.

At the same time that videodic was in development, the IBM-PC was introduced and the Apple II was going full guns. We decided to implement an RS-232 interface on the MAV port. Basically, the videodisc player "woke up" in the MAV mode. However, if the device connected to the videodisc asserted a "break" or an extended space on the line, then the unit would switch to the RS-232 mode. The commands were ASCII equivalents for FF, REV, etc. One should be able to communicate with the port using a PC and the terminal program in Windows or Procomm or some other communications program. The command sent by the PC will cause a response by the player. I left RCA before J line was released or I might have the command set. The commands were one or two letters and were the obvious combinations for the function that you want. FF for fast forward, etc. Give it a try but the interface needs to be 0 to 5v unless the boys put the clamp diode in the input circuit.

Again these "memories" are my best recollections. Lots of good stuff in

There was enough belt material left to determine that there were approx. 12 teeth per inch, the belt appeared to be 1/8" wide. In measureing the circumference of the strings it came to about 15".So I guess that is what I`m looking for.I tried Sears and got the expected response that part are no longer available for this unit.Tried a few electronic repair shops and they suggested Radio Shack.Radio Shack does have a computer listing of some units and the Tandy replacement p/n.In this case no luck. So can anybody steer me to a parts source, sell me a belt or help in any way? The machine is in absolutly perfect condition. Even has the boxed remote and owners manual. I sent them this letter, let's see if they publish it. "Ken Kormanís article on the history of widescreen (June 1997) cites the 1984 tape and laserdisk release of Woody Allenís Mahattan as beginning of widescreen releases in the proper aspect ratio on home video. This is inaccurate as another video format made a commitment to letterboxing on video earlier. Manhattan made its video debut on CED disk, and Video Magazine wrote about the release, commending RCA at the time for taking the stepóshame on you for forgetting your own history and perspective. Letis give credit where credit is due. RCA began issuing letterboxed titles of "cult" favorites on CED in 1983 (before the start-up of the Criterion Company). Among the titles issued were Monty Python and the Holy Grail, The Long Goodbye, King of Hearts and Amacordóall of which would not see letterboxed presentations in other video formats until at least 10 years later. The disk magazines featured an icon depicting a letterboxed tv screen with the following explanation: "This videodisc features RCAis innovative widescreen technique. In order to preserve the complete width

I just purchased a CED player from somoeone + disks. The model is a SFT-100, the seller said it had worked fine wehn he had it. He bought it from someone who kept it in EX shape, it looks like new. It was packed well for transit and a felt pad was put inside the machine under the door to keep the turntable from spinning. I unpacked it and hooked it up. I started getting a skipping prblem with it. I have a SKt-090 and the disks DID NOT SKIP in that machine so I assume it was not the disks. I turned it off and tried it again in a half hour or so. I tried the same diks and they worked ok for about 5 min. Then the skipping returned jsut like a LP would skip over and over again, the CED jsut played the same immage over and over again and would not move forward. I unpluged the unit and figured the problem was dirt on the needle. I lifted it out and used a brand new soft LP brush on it. I put the cartige back in and then tried the player agin with the same disks that skipped before, the asame problem occured. I tried another disk and it played FINE, I then tried a BRAND NEW SEALED DISK. The new sealed never been used disk also skipped very badly!!

So what do you think the problem is? 1. Worn needle ? 2.Electronic problem? 3. Arm out of balance? 4. Disk loading improperly? 5. Turntable needing adjustment(it seem to track find to me no woobling) The selector swich is off a bit also how to adjust it??

I hope it is only the needle if not I may return it to the seller. I am getting a SGT-250 soon so I hope the 3rd CEd player will be the charm with no problems. The 090 I got is having a lot of problems 1. The disk is somtimes left in the machine (worn belt?) 2. The turntable is woobling(how to fix?)

Hitachi CED players (and their Realistic and Sears name-brand equivalents) use a orange-colored reinforced nylon timing belt to precisely advance the pickup arm assembly. This belt is an industry standard part that should be available from parts suppliers specializing in timing belts. Here are the specifications:

1/8" wide 190T80 timing belt

The 190T80 number should be printed in tiny lettering on the smooth side of the belt and means the belt has a total of 190 teeth with a pitch of 0.080" (pitch being the distance between the same point on adjacent teeth). All Hitachi, Realistic, and Hitachi-style Sears players use the same belt, and the part is still available through Sears Parts at (800)366-7278 for \$6.99. The part number is 46-39699-3.

One point of confusion about Sears players is that the model number 934.5481135 on the back of the Sears gold-colored Stereo model is the model number for a VCR rather than a CED player. The correct number for this player is 934.54810350 which is the number printed in the owner's and service manuals, and is also the number used by the Sears Parts people. All the Sears players should have a zero on the end of the model number, which is omitted on a lot of the player labels.

When Dimensia was marketed about a year later (after the CED cancellation announcement), the DISC button was renamed VID2, but it continued to function as a DISC button to control a 400 series player. Due to the layout of the circuit board inside these first generation Digital Command Centers, the third button from the left on the top row will always function as a DISC mode button.

But you may have noticed that the CRK 42 units you have are missing the third button from the left. There's just an empty spot where the button should be. This was a strange thing for RCA to do, since the PAGE, BAND, and SEEK buttons specific to interactive CED usage are still labeled on the unit. The good news is that the DISC button is still there, it's just hidden under the top panel, so the CRK 42 remote can be used for full interactive control of the 400 series player. There are two ways to accomplish this. With batteries installed in the unit, remove the four screws holding the top and bottom of the case together, then remove the five screws holding the circuit board to the top panel. Now the keypad can be separated from the top panel (being careful not to lose the grounding spring), the hidden button can be pushed, and the unit reassembled. As long as the batteries continue to power the unit, and no other mode button is pushed, the Digital Command Center will function as a 400 series remote. The other option would be to drill or cut a hole in the casing above the DISC button position when the remote is disassembled. Then a straightened paperclip or some other small instrument could be used to activate the DISC button.

Has anybody noticed that the Phantasm disc has a scene deleted from the tape version of the movie? (I haven't bought the deluxe laserdisc version yet to check to see if the scene is in it.) The scene in question occurs on side two, but I'm not sure about how far into the side it is. After Mike finds the time gate, at one point the lights go out and Mike uses a cigarette lighter to illuminate the room. As he flicks the lighter, he sees one of the Jawa-looking creatures very near his face, and he says something like "Oh, shit." This scene is not on my Embassy pre-rec tape of the film. It may have been in the Magnetic Video version that circulated in the very early 80's, but, again, I haven't been able to verify this.

Another strange thing about the CED is that the soundtrack has some very unusual "misplaced" audio. At one point on side one, Jody's car squeals out of the bar parking lot, and at the beginning of the next scene, you can hear a repeat of the squealout. There's another place where the audio is wrong, but I can't think of it now for the life of me. If anyone knows where RCA got their master for Phantasm, it may shed some light on this. If anyone would like to know any specifics about the various anomalies, e-mail me and I'll check the disc to get exact time references and specific info about the scenes in question.

Since I had a few requests, here are the differences between the Phantasm CED and the tape version. I was working solely from memory when I did the last post, and, after rewatching my disc, I discovered that there is only one audio "misplacement." The scene that is missing from the tape and is on the CED disc is, I have been informed, also on the deluxe laserdisc pressing. But--for those of you (like me) who don't have the laserdisc, I've got a transcript of the missing scene.

First, the misplaced audio. It occurs on Side 1 of the disc, right as the time counter turns from 24 to 25. It occurs at the end of Mike's nightmare--there is about one second of the sound of a car screeching to a halt instead of the screams of the ghouls in the nightmare. This scene is immediately followed by a scene of Jody's car screeching into the parking lot of a bar, accompanied by the same audio from the end of the previous scene. So it's not, as one reader suggested, the RCA technicians forgeting to turn down a carry-over audio track from the master--it looks instead to be a mistake made when editing the RCA master. It seems that this is a likely time for a reel break, and the audio from the next reel was inadvertantly put at the end of the previous reel. Just a guess. By the way, this problem does not exist on my pre-recorded copy of the Embassy tape.

Now, on to the CED extra. On Side 2, right as the counter hits the 29 minute mark, a twenty-eight second scene occurs that is not on the tape versions of the film. What follows is a transcript of the extra footage:

Over a black screen, we hear:

Jody: Okay, stay together.

Mike: Wait a sec. I think I gotta lighter.

Jody: Quick, light it up.

Mike lights the lighter, revealing one of the dwarf creatures in front of him. Mike screams as the creature leaps on him, knocking the lighter from his hand. The screen goes black again as sounds of their struggle continue for a few seconds. Then we hear:

Jody: Over here--follow me.

We hear the sound of footsteps, followed by the sound of a door slamming. After a beat we hear:

Reggie: Jody, where are ya? Mike?

A growl fills the darkness.

Reggie: Oh, shit!

Thus ends "the dark scene." For those of you who have only a tape copy, it occurs about 72 minutes into the film, right after the lights go out in the gateway room. Immediately after the scene, the film cuts to a shot of Jody outside the mortuary, calling for Mike.

I hope this hasn't been too long-winded, but it's always a plus to find extra things on your CEDs--and due to your responses, I know there are apparently several Phantasm fans out there.

The scene in "Phantasm" that is missing in some versions was edited out by mistake by a rushed telcine job, they thought that it was just black space that was just a leader or something, not part of the movie. The current laserdisc version has director's running commentary that mentions this when it comes on. I have this plus the CED and a copy of one of the later Embassy VHS tapes, I'll have to run all 3 simultaneously sometime to check out the sound discrepancies. BTW has anyone seen/heard the Magnetic Video laserdisc of this movie? It's "electronically re-channeled" for stereo, the new disc was remixed for stereo so it'd be interesting to see how it compares to the old disc. (I kinda don't like stereo-ized versions of mono soundtracks, but that's another story.) I did see this movie on TV a few years ago, slightly edited, and it was in some kind of weird-sounding stereo. It sounded fake but the dialogue stayed in the center so it wasn't the result of those annoying "synthesized stereo" processors that a lot of TV stations used when stereo TV first came out (thankfully most stations here stopped using them a long time ago!) On another note, does anyone else have the CED of "Scrooge" that is in stereo only on side 2? Side 1 has a stereo signal but the sound is

completely mono, when I first watched it last Christmas I thought that was how the whole movie probably was, as there were a few older movies on CBS/FOX video tapes that were in "electronically re-channeled" stereo that produced very little stereo effect, but there was a dramatic difference in seperation once side 2 started.

I find it pretty amusing that my 14 1/2 year old player produces decent surround sound while there are people out there watching recent movies on MONO VHS machines! Who's -really- nuts here?

Re: possible footage missing from some versions of "The Black Hole": This reminds me of the CED of "Escape to Witch Mountain"- an IMPORTANT scene looks to have been deliberately cut out! The only other place I've seen this movie was on network TV way back when; when the bad guys bring the kids to the big house and leave them in that big playroom with all the cool stuff, the brother starts playing his harmonica and makes some of the puppets and toys in the room dance telepathically; meanwhile the bad guys are watching this over hidden camera in a room full of video monitors and stuff (I specifically remember a large reel-to-reel machine in that scene). On the CED, the scene fades out right when the kid first picks up the harmonica, I assume the song he played had some copyright snafu that made them delete the whole scene. This renders a following scene completely senseless- the next day the kids are confronted about their magic powers and are told "Don't try to hide it, we saw all that playing around you were doing" (I forget the actual dialogue there.) The way Disney does stuff nowadays, they'd probably take that scene out and deny it ever existed (like the altering the allegedly racist lyrics in Aladdin for the video release, and their Touchstone movie "The Program" had a major scene, the infamous "freeway scene" taken out in the middle of its theatrical release after someone was killed imitating it!) As for the DVD thing again, I'm afraid that any problems with it will be brushed off like it's no big deal; if you read some old magazines describing CED's skipping problem I've seen a few comments like "this is only a minor annoyance, and this is still a great way to get your own video collection", in other words RCA paid us to keep our mouths shut about it! I had a letter published in Video magazine recently accusing them of doing something similar with DSS; someone had actually written "I did still see some motion artifacts but they were very subtle and I'm sure most people won't even notice them." Their big DVD article last issue was a major butt-kissing session; they even made a big deal about how great the built-in subtitle feature was, so you can watch a movie with the sound turned down when you have to keep the house quiet. Gee, what a revolutionary feature, I've never seen anything that can display what people are saying on the screen, ever. Oh yeah, except for those closed caption things, but otherwise this is totally new. Sorry I'm rambling, I've been up all night!

Picked up a book from amazon.com titled "The Business of Research- RCA and Teh VideoDisc" by Margaret B.W. Graham. It is an interesting story of the behind the scenes movement that ultimately led to the release and withdrawal of CED in the marketplace. One fact I previously did not know. I always thought that the diamond stylus had allowed increasing the groove density leading to 60 minutes per side. In fact RCA had been able to do this for several years but the sapphire stylus which only lasted for 50 hours broke even more frequently when designed to play the smaller grooves. They almost decided to release a 30 minute player which would play the 60 minute discs with a new cartridge, but decided against it. It is a fascinating book and was only 15.95 in soft cover.

Both problems are probably due to function motor drive belt failure. Here is the text of a web page detailing replacement of this belt. If you have web access, the site below has photos to accompany the text.

Function Motor Drive Belt Replacement

These instructions are for replacing the function motor drive belt on RCA's J and K series electric-loading CED players. Failure of this drive belt is the single most common reason why these players fail to operate. The function motor drive belt transfers the torque to load and unload the disc, so when it first begins to fail the player may eject caddies without unloading the disc, since the caddy wasn't drawn far enough inside to reach the latching mechanism. This drive belt also provides the torque necessary to rotate the function gear assembly to the various positions corresponding to Load, Play, Unload, and Off. So if the player, when turned on, takes a long time to enter Load mode where the access door is open and the LED display flashes L, then the belt is beginning to fail. It is not uncommon for a player that has been stored for a long time to never enter Load mode when turned on because the drive belt has completely failed and all the function motor can do is endlessly spin. All J and K series players use the same function belt, RCA Stock No. 157592, which corresponds to the more readily available PRB No. SCB3.6. If you have difficulty finding this belt, you can mail me a dollar to the address at the bottom of this document, and I'll send you one.

(1) To begin installation, remove the two philips screws from the back of the cabinet top and remove the top by lifting from the back. Locate the function motor gear train in the left rear of the player as shown in figure 1.

(2) The function motor gear train is partially concealed by a small black cover held in place by two philips screws corresponding

to the screw holes indicated in figure 2. Remove these screws and the gear cover, being careful not to lose the felt washer that fits over the 2nd reduction gear mounting shaft.

(3) Slip the combined 2nd reduction gear and pinion off the mounting shaft, which will fully expose the 1st reduction gear and pulley as shown in figure 3.

(4) If necessary, the combined 1st reduction gear and pulley can be slipped off its mounting shaft to free the old belt. Put this back on prior to installing the new belt.

(5) Install the new belt by slipping it around the pulley, then stretching it up and over the function motor drive shaft.

(6) Place the combined 2nd reduction gear and pinion onto its mounting shaft making sure it seats all the way down, so the mounting shaft slightly protrudes.

(7) Place the felt washer over the protruding end of the 2nd reduction gear mounting shaft, then replace the gear cover, making sure the felt washer doesn't fall off before the screws are fully seated.

(8) Replace the cabinet top by holding it at a 15 degree angle while aligning the front edge before lowering the rear to the closed position.

(9) Replace the two philips screws to secure the cabinet top.

Here's a good reason to have "The Bette Midler Show", from Embassy Home Entertainment, which is a shot-on-video special for HBO from 1976. The beginning has the "Special Presentation" intro that HBO used during that time, it has some really cool music! I recently played the intro over and over about 10 times, it is just so cool! I think HBO still shows their famous movie intro (the metal HBO logo flying in space) but this one is so dated I'd be surprised if they still used it. HBO is like CED videodiscs in a way because to me it's something that served a useful purpose when it was new but is now no longer needed. I had it for a while just because my roommate wanted it, and I hardly ever watched it. They take forever to get new movies when they've already been available on laserdisc for a long time, and they never show anything in letterbox format! They sometimes put voice-overs over the end credits too, this is completely unacceptable and led to my dumping cable altogether! I remember when it was cool just to see recent movies "on TV" with no commercials, but now that there's so much prerecorded stuff out there it's just not necessary to have movie channels like this. Lots of people have at least 2 VCRs now too, so they don't even need HBO to record movies from when they can just copy rental tapes.

What amazed me about the Bette Midler special was that it was in true stereo! Stereo TV was miles away in 1976, I don't even think they did FM simulcasts back then either (before they had stereo TV I remember a lot of cable and regular TV shows, mostly music-oriented, being simulcast on FM stations so you could hear them in stereo.) So does anyone know the story on why they did this in stereo, and who actually got to hear it when it was first shown?

I have a few other videotaped shows on CED that I'm amazed are in stereo, Neil Diamond's "Love at the Greek", which looks like it was made for network TV since there are fade-outs for commercial breaks, was also made in 1976 and is in stereo. But what really wows me is "Who's Afraid of Opera," which there are 3 volumes of, which was produced for television shot on video in 1973 and is in stereo! What's the story on this one? BTW, I have some "phony" stereo CEDs too, "The First Barry Manilow Special" is labeled "stereo" and has a stereo signal, but is really in mono. That was also a TV special, from 1977. "Fraggle Songs," a collection of songs from the HBO show "Fraggle Rock," is labeled Stereo but is really in that processed synthesized stereo that a lot of TV stations used during mono shows when stereo TV first came out (thank god most of the stations here quit doing that! It was annoying as heck!) If you listen to just the left channel of this disc, the sound is mostly low-pitched and the right channel is higher-pitched. The CED as well as the first release in other formats of Disney's "Pinocchio" uses another kind of this synthesized stereo.

I recently purchased an RCA Selectavision SJT 300 at a thrift store. I would be very grateful if someone with some expertixe on these machines could give me some advice on how to get it running. When I brought it home and took off the top I discovered the loading mechanism belt was gone and the CED turntable had come out of position. I replaced the belt and put the turntable back in what I am assuming is it's proper position. When I powered the machine up it went into the L mode. The front door opened enough to easily insert a CED. Ι inserted the CED and it seemed to load properly. At this point, with the top off so I could observe what's going on, the following happened; 1. As soon as CED loaded the needle moves into position over the CED, the - indicator came on and for a short time the Side 1 indicator came on. After about three seconds the Side 2 indicator also came on. So, the window read -- and both side 1 & side 2 lights were on. 2.If I press PLAY nothing happens. 3.If I press REJECT the needle moves back off the CED, but nothing more - - indicator is still on, Side 1 & 2 still on. happens. 4.If I press POWER off, the machine powers down. When I press POWER on, the needle moves into position again. All indicators the same, - - in window and Side 1 & 2 lights lit. REJECT once again moves the CED back. 5. If I manually move the large gear on the left side of the machine (where the belt that controls the loading mechanism is) I can get the front door to open and the L load light to come on. 6. With the load light on nothing happens when I press REJECT. Nothing happens when I press PLAY. Nothing happens if I press POWER once. However, when I press POWER a second time the front door closes, the needle moves into position, the - - lights come on, the side 1 & 2 lights come on and I'm right back where I started from. 7. The CED never spins. I can't get it to go into the play mode and I can't get it into the Unload mode. I now have the CED stuck in the machine. 8. All gears seem to be in excellent condition, no rods are broken or bent, can anyone tell me what I might try to get the machine functioning properly? I would appreciate any advice. Thank you.

Hello everyone,

First of all, I would like to thank Tom for his CED site. It has been informative and most interesting. The links to other sites are also very helpful. It is because of his site that I have an interest in CED technology and may start an active collection of discs (I have only five thus far).

I have two questions regarding my two players to which I was hoping to get answers.

I recently picked up an RCA, SFT 100 W (I already had a Zenith player, but wanted to compare the differences and maybe use the Zenith as a spare).

It seems to be in good condition, but the turntable does not rise when the door is closed (lever moved up from Load to Play). It does spin when the lever is brought down from Off to Play (with a disk already having been previously loaded), but it still remains at the base position, maybe 1/4" below the disk. I need to know what may be operating incorrectly / need repair, how to remove the turntable (if necessary), etc.

Regarding the Zenith, it works fairly well, but stutters consistently at certain positions of the counter, mostly between 30 and 40. When I say that it stutters I mean that the video and audio jump slightly forward, sometimes losing a word or two of the dialogue, and sometimes this stuttering repeats several or more times before the play settles back to normal. [By the way, the Zenith's configuration/design is very much like the RCA, and they take the same stylus cartridge].

I thought this problem might be due to a slipping stylus-transport motor belt (my phrase, it is the small belt driving the worm gear assembly) or maybe to uneven resistance as the stylus transport assembly is moved slowly forward (suddenly encountering less resistance, and thus the lurching forward and skipping of small segments of the audio/video). I figured that perhaps the worm gear or gear train might need lubrication to solve this, but don't know which type lube to use and how sparingly it should be applied, etc.

Any insight anyone can provide will be most appreciated! Thank you.

Remember the format died because there WAS no practical use for it, since you already had laserdiscs, and even tapes, that were better quality than CED. I could already imagine "The Lion King" complete with the red and yellow circle around the picture that RCA's Disney movies all had. I recently put up a web page on the Pioneer LaserActive system for another project I'm working on. This consists of a photo of the CLD-A100 player and Pioneer's intro press release from 1993. Here's the URL:

This press release bears a strong resemblence to RCA's initial output on the CED System in 1981; i.e. much higher expectations than what actually came to pass. By 1995 LaserActive was dead and the local Incredible Universe sold off their players for \$299 which included the Sega PAC, Pyramid Patrol Mega LD, Disney's Fantasia Box Set, and an 8" LaserActive promotional disc. The LaserActive titles were originally \$120 or \$180 (3-D releases), and these eventually got reduced to \$30. The basic player was widely available through liquidators like Damark for a while, but I believe they are all gone now. The Sega PAC is by far the most common, and in addition to the TurboGraphx and Karaoke PAC's, Pioneer also released a PAC-PC1 for computer interfacing.

In the end, only three LD-ROM titles and fifteen Mega LD titles were released, with the two 1995 releases, "Blue Chicago Blues" and "Goku" being quite rare. I had a very difficult time locating "Goku", which is a shame, since this title really showcases what LaserActive was capable of when a lot of effort was devoted to the programming (a hint to DVD developers).

How? I have read in the FAQ that RCA expected to sell 500,000 units in their first year, and sold that many by the time they cancelled the format. The problems you have to contend with, namely, are the multiple style styluses used in the various manufacturer's players (I own both a Toshiba VP100, and a Hitachi player, both use different style cartridges). Why would RCA want to even consider resupporting a format that is over 15 years old, and hasn't been sold for more than 10? What's the point? How many people have junked their players since then? How many people that respond to the petition will actually buy supplies? The sole purpose of a company is NOT to supply parts for a hobbiest. Read that last sentence again. The sole purpose of a company *IS* to make money. There is little possibility for RCA to make money on the CED, in fact, they never did. Why should they extend their disaster?

I think you just answered your question about whether RCA will decide to support CED again. It's about as futile as an owner of a TI99/4A expecting Texas Instruments to manufacture software for their computer again.

Two problems I see are immediately evident with acquiring the disc stamping machine...and this will become evident to you as well if you read the information on the CED magic page regarding the manufacturing of CEDs.

First, there's a LOT more that goes into "stamping" a CED. First, you must have a metal master, this master is plated with another metal (zinc, I believe?). Where do I buy these? The first step in the production of a CED is to have a master cut on an enormous cutting recorder, using a one-inch master videotape (or some other high quality format). The master is tested, then a mold is made from the master. THEN the actual pressing takes place. After the pressing is done, the discs, which ARE STILL NOT PLAYABLE, must be doped with carbon (this is where the capacitance, in capacitance electronic disc comes from) in a special type of tank. Now, the final steps theoretically could be dropped (i.e. applying silicone lube and putting them in a protective caddy).

The second problem with your argument is that all of the above I have mentioned is beyond the scope of any CED enthusiast. The process requires a clean room. Metal discs used to form the master can't be purchased (at least not feasably), and on top of that, if ANY copies of say, Mars Attacks, have to be approved by the intellectual owners of that property.

While I agree that your idea sounds fantastic, and I would love to see something like this happen...there's just no way that something like this could be feasable to a group of hobbyists. It would be a nice piece to a museum collection, but beyond that it's not very practical. Think about it: there were only two companies producing CEDs when they were available, RCA and CBS, obviously other companies considered it a flop.

It is not a matter of better, it is a matter of nostalgia and want. Of course in no comparison is CED greater than Laserdisc or the newly developed (D)digital (V)idea (D)isc. However it has to be asked what would the CED system be like today. For example, since IBM made their first personal computer in 1981 the capacity and reliability of diskettes has increased. This of course has to be taken into effect with any disc, pretty much, including the CED. Since the development of the disk by IBM in 1981, the capacity and reliability has more than tripled and is continuously increasing. How exactly does this apply to CED? Even in the slightest you might ask. When RCA finally released the system in 1981 for public use, the capacity of the disc was 60 minutes (30 minutes per side). I have postulated a system called E-CED (Enhanced Capacitance Electronic Disc), that coheres to the same theories and works just as the floppy disk does. In realistic comparison if RCA Corporation would not have been bought out by General Electric, that the capacity of the CED would be 6 hours per disc (3 hours per side). This due to the inevitable increase of the density of grooves on the disc. As well as with the enhancement of the stylus that would of eventually taken place. Since RCA was bought out and no future development occurred while other development in almost in the same field did, it would be easy to enhance the CED now. This strikes another question. How could we enhance and how could it be paid? Compared to other systems in 1984, CED was ahead of VHS and just behind Laserdisc. Now in 1997 it is slightly behind VHS, way behind Laserdisc, and astronomically behind, DVD. Of course think of this, the CED Player in comparison with a Laserdisc player has fewer complex components. Replace each simple component with a more complex component and a better system made. Anyone with the proper technological and electronics skill and training could improve this system to a point in which it is better than VHS and Laserdisc again. In all admission it would be difficult perhaps even impossible to enhance the CED system to a point in which it would be better than DVD. Even with this there are still some of you who are still skeptical about this

and have certain beliefs. There are indeed some who state that the reason why the CED failed was that there was no practical use. True? No. This is false. The CED failed, not physically, but economically because of weak marketing strategies. One could sell small white plastic blocks that have no apparent use if they are properly marketed. It is a known fact that RCA Corporation spent more time working on quality equipment than marketing it. (If only all companies were like this.) It is a personal opinion that RCA did a great job on the development of the system, yet they didnít have the best resources for marketing in which that is why they failed. Getting back to the original notion of practicality, the CED was relatively practical and it did have a use, it was just not the most properly marketed system at the time. RCA Corporation spent most of their time developing rather than making the system look good for purchase. I read with some interest the effort of some to revive or procure CED technology for those who currently own the machines. The same problem faced LaserDisc owners in 1981 when DiscoVision Associates withdrew from active participation in production and distribution of LaserDiscs. (Actually DiscoVision Associates still exist and they even have a web pages! Their only business is the collection of royalties due.) It was Pioneer who jumped into the scene and kept LaserDisc going for the last 16 years although that now appears to be coming to an end. I was thus surprised when in 1984 RCA following traditional American business practice opted out of CED, not because they were losing money but because they were not earning money fast They sold 100,000 players in the first year instead of the 200,000 enough. planned and had sold 500,000 by April of 1984 when they pulled the plug. At that time there were only 100,000 LaserDisc players. I expected a Japanese company to step in since CED disc manufacturing was extremely profitable for RCA, which is why they promised to continue production into 1987, though they stopped in 1986. But no Japanese company did step in and had a group of interested American investor wanted to they could have stepped in and purchased RCA's player and disc manufacturing facilities for a great price. It was not to be. I am sure if they had CED would have continued to increase in market penetration. But the time to do that was in the late 1980's not now. I am sure with storage space at a premium the CED pressing and mastering equipment has been destroyed. Also since CED used technology very similar to LP technology that was very prevalent in the past but not now, getting simple raw materials would be difficult. I have recently finished reading "RCA and the VideoDisc" by Margaret Graham. It is a fascinating view of the release and demise of CED from the corporate

It is a fascinating view of the release and demise of CED from the corporate view. Suffice to say RCA was counting on CED starting off very big and continuing to build, when it didn't the naysayers were in charge from as early as 1982 and pressed for its withdrawal and finally won. They wanted and got the tax write offs that were so big at the time. Remember that when RCA was bought out by GE there was not a consolidation of two giants but a dismemberment and sell off of RCA parts to gain corporate profits for GE.

Such were the 80's . Don't make money by making and selling things, but by buying and selling companies. I will follow with interest the CED musings in this publication.

I never compared this to CED, but I have 2 of Pioneer's "Zoom" laserdiscs, which are sent out periodically to retailers (got them from a VideoConcepts store when they were closing them all) One is almost entirely a demonstration of Laseractive and one can't help feeling sorry for the guy talking about all the research and commitment Pioneer was putting into it. I never saw it promoted to the public very well, but they talk about it here like it might be "the next big thing." The only Laseractive disc I have is "3-D Museum" which I also have LCD shutter glasses that work with it. I'd like to get some game discs if they ever show up cheap enough; that's what I think doomed this system as well as the laserdisc-based arcade video games in 1983-84- since the main parts are prerecorded, there's really only one way a game can go since you're playing with the same footage every time, and that gets old really fast. The system was a rip-off too, the player itself cost about as much as a really good LD player only it didn't have auto-reverse, and you couldn't play any games with it unless you paid another few hundred bucks for the "packs" (which both could've been built into the machine making for a really good unit- Turbographix and Genesis games!) To top it all off, the game discs were around \$200 each when they first came out !! Where in history is CD-I (Interactive) going to fall? I recently got a player at Fry's (formerly Incredible Universe) for \$15 (no that's not a typo!) I'd never expect to find one that cheap even at a thrift store! The manual it comes with starts out with "You've just purchased one of the best-supported, best-backed products available today, which will provide you with many years of enjoyment." This was a great example of a product in search of an identity- was it a game system, cheap home computer, educational device, or what??? Looking forward to finding some bootleg MPEG movie CD's though, I've heard they have some movies that are still in theaters available on these things. The only legitimate stuff I've been able to find is porno, the motion on the 3 discs I have is strange looking and I can't tell if it's the source material, bad mastering, or if that's how everything looks on MPEG-1 discs. And yes, I was watching them for the plot and the acting ;) I also have the Space Ace game that uses the MPEG card, and it looks pretty good but animated stuff often holds up better under "digital" situations- noticed a bit of "weave" and "jump" in the film though, which I thought would get lost in a sea of blocks so that impressed me. I saw "Star Trek" playing in a store a long time ago and it looked pretty bad, I don't have any of the more 'major' films Philips put out that would probably better show how good or bad the overall quality is. With laserdisc having already been

out, and now DVD, this format has pretty much always been pointless, its only advantage apparently being that they're incredibly cheap to make, which accounts for the majority of discs to be either bootlegs and/or porn.

You may not know this, but a great many of the CED disk assemblies were injection molded right here in western PA by Precise Plastics. They did a lot of the original development work on the molds. As was mentioned in the last CED e-mail, surely the format would have continued to evolve and many of the shortcomings would have gone away. The last CED players were evidence that the art was improving. My SJT-400 has much less problem with skipping than the older players, as well as some really fun features like freeze frame.

The thought of a clear caddy was not likely, though. The plant manager where I work was with Precise when they were making those caddies and he tells me that they were made of crystal styrene. Crystal styrene is clear but somewhat brittle so an additive was used to make it impact resistant. That additive also makes the resin opaque. Try dropping a hammer on one of those clear audio cassette shells then the same on a CED caddy and you'll see why they did it.

If you have a white caddy (Precise didn't make the colored ones) that no longer is usable, cut the two halves apart. (They are sonic welded, so taking them apart will ruin them.) Look for the little round circles that are the mark from ejector pins used to push the part out of the mold. If there is a "P" on one of them, it came from Precise.

Because most if not all of this kind of equipment came from vendors

rather than directly from RCA, it may be a stumbling block to putting CED back in production. Molds like this can easily cost \$100,000 or more if they have been scrapped. My understanding is that RCA *was* manufacturing discs in 1987; the last major new title apparently was "Back To The Future." Also, the reporters who cover the consumer electronics industry -- several of whom I know fairly well -- were pretty much in agreement that RCA was *losing* money overall on CED, not merely missing their return-on-investment targets; they were selling the players below cost in order to build a customer base for discs, but didn't do enough of that to recoup their losses.

The CED really doesn't spin THAT fast. Comparitively speaking, the floppy disk drive spins at 300 RPM, and the Laserdisc spins at a max of around 1800 RPM.

There are a few reasons that the discs spin at 450 RPM. Firstly, if the disc were to spin too slowly, for example, the 33 1/3 RPM like you mentioned, the information would be packed too densely and the information couldn't be extracted back off of the disc.

Here's a little math :)

The CED media has the following characteristics:

Each revolution contains 4 complete frames of video (as well as sound) If you look at the disk you can see this fact because the disk is subdivided into 8 sectors (NTSC is an interlaced format, so two sectors are required to make a single frame). CED's are approximately 12 inches in diameter approx " of this is actual recording media.

CED's have 9500 grooves per inch

Okay, now if we keep this in mind ~3.25" x 9500 (note: we use 3.25"

instead of 6.5 because we don't want to count the grooves twice) gives us ~30875 grooves per side. On top of this 30875 grooves x 4 (4 frames per revolution remember) gives us the total number of frames per side... 123500. We know that the NTSC format is 30 frames per second, so we divide 12350 / 30 ... 4116.7 seconds per side, divide by 60 and we get approx 68 minutes of video per side (please keep in mind that the measurements are approximate which accounts for the discrepancy).

Now, we can learn something really interesting from this by comparing it to the laserdisc. On the laserdisc, there are only TWO sectors per side as opposed to eight (so there is only one frame per revolution). Ever wonder why the CED doesn't have a still feature? It's because the disc doesn't spin fast enough for it. On the laserdisc, it is possible because after it has finished drawing a complete frame, it is already back at the beginning of that frame...the disc has made one complete revolution. However, on a CED, a single frame takes 1/4th a complete revolution, and therefore it hasn't reached the beginning of the frame (it has to skip three frames to get to the still frame again).

So why didn't the designers of the CED make it spin around 1800 RPM like the Laserdisc? There are probably two or three major reasons for this: First, since CED is a contact medium, it is likely a higher RPM would have caused the needle to resonate and skip around and would therefore make it unreliable. Second, it would reduce the amount of playback time significantly without increasing the groove density (since without changing the groove density you would have only 15 minutes per side). Third, by increasing the groove density to compensate, it would have required a finer needle and would make the media more subject to damage by scratching and make either the needle or the disc wear out significantly faster.

Food for thought anyways. :)

Dave asked why the Ced disks spin so fast, i belive it is because of the 6Mhz(6,000,000 hz) or so frequency of the video + audio signal. At 33 1/3 rpm these high frequencies would not register in the grooves, because the waves of the signal are so minute that a higher surface to stylus speed is required for the cutter to engrave these high frequencies. The 33 1/3 is acceptable for audio because the highest frequency audible is around 20khz (20,000 hz). I suppose it would be theoretically possible to record video signals at 33 1/3 rpm, if the laquer was of ultra-high quality, ultra-fine, to the point of being smooth on a microscopic level, used in conjunction with a precision cutting head that was exremely powerful at the high frequencies. But its a hell of a lot easier to spin the disk at 400rpms though. I belive that the disk on the voyager is nothing more than a copper Lp, if even that much, how would some alien be able to play it? was there a player on board? and ive also wondered if it would be playable after all those years of collecting cosmic dust. maybe its just a kind of hood ornament! The records on the Voyager probes did include both audio and still images, but rather than being a CED, the disc is actually two copper audio LP masters bonded back-to-back and plated with gold. These were mastered at 16 2/3 RPM, providing a one hour playback time on each side. Side 1 contains 116 images, greetings in 60 languages, a whale song, and music; while Side 2 has 60 minutes of additional music. Side 1 faces inward, being well protected from micrometeorite impact, and is estimated to still be playable after 1 billion years. A stylus and cartridge are stored on each spacecraft, and the gold anodized aluminum cover the disc is sealed behind has pictorial instructions for playback etched into it's surface, using the transition time of the hydrogen atom as the basal time unit. B & W images require 8 seconds to play back, while color images require 24 seconds, and the recovered image is somewhat similar to an NTSC television frame, consisting of 512 scan lines arranged vertically rather than horizontally.

There are a few of CED tie-ins related to the Voyager project. The CED title "Star Trek: the Motion Picture" contains a mock-up of a Voyager probe, but no gold cover is visible on the unit, and the Voyager 6 designation is now an historical inaccuracy, as NASA launched only two Voyagers. The two companies that later mastered CED's, RCA and CBS, both provided technical consulting on the mastering of the Voyager record. Herbert Schlosser, then president of NBC, was a production consultant on the record who later became RCA's vice president of VideoDisc programming. He can be seen in the book _RCA and the VideoDisc_ , and is also the gentleman seen standing in front of a wall of VideoDiscs in a publicity photo RCA distributed widely in 1980 leading up to the CED System introduction.

Cayea As Tom Howe pointed out in his updated CED FAQ's, perhaps someday Thomson Consumer Electronics will release a commemorative disc on the twentieth anniversary of the CED system. Well, the twentieth anniversary is in 2001, so far I haven't seen any movement on their end. As the 750,000 possible CED users are struggling to keep their equipment up we see a problem. A problem that now unless we ourselves purchase the rights, that only Thomson can help us with. Life is life, business is business. Of course that is the way corporate America thinks today, and that is no different compared to General Electric or Thomson Consumer Electronic either. For whatever reason General Electric just had to have RCA Corporation back in 1986, it is a corporate fact of life, big companies or richer companies have to swallow up little or poorer companies. Now that RCA is gone, we find ourselves scurrying to get whatever help or equipment that we can find. As with players, movies, and stylus cartridges dwindle away, we have to find a solution. This is one of the other reasons why we need to join together and get this technology started again. This technology is just like an old boat, the longer we wait without any action, the sooner we sink. It has been said that Thomson in all probability still has Disc Stamping Station as well as some other machinery for the production of CED hardware, such as stylus cartridges. From a relative point of view, purchasing these items from Thomson Consumer Electronics should be easy. For they have no use for it at all, however we do. For I, just being one person, do not have the financial resources to do this. Yet, the almost 750,000 possible CED enthusiasts do have the resources to accomplish this. I am new to the CED Digest and am interested in the discussion of breathing new life into CED. I just bought a CED player and have collected a few discs. Although the few experiences I had with CED while it was new involved skipping discs while watching them, I must say I am quite impressed with the quality of CED over even modern day VHS prerecorded fair. As an avid Beta user since 1984, I wish this format would have won out over VHS. In my opinion Sony really had a chance to overcome VHS and even modern laser disc with its' ED Beta VCR; but dropped it for fear that it would hurt their industrial 3/4" sales! As an ED Beta owner, the quality of the format is breathtaking, being able to record at laser disc level of quality.

I have been working for General Electric for a couple of years now and as you may already know, the consumer electronics division of RCA was sold to Thompson Consumer Electronics group shortly after GE purchased RCA in 1986. RCA and even General Electric products are made by Thompson. This may give CED a chance because with the company mandated margin levels for their divisions, CED wouldn't stand much of a chance of coming back here at GE.

I have seen the estimated number of CED users. Are these based on past sales or actual people actively using CED to this day? Probably the most feasible way of pressing discs would be to prove to a small production company that there is a market awaiting the new release of titles on disc. However, I have read of small duplication companies that are willing to take all of the responsibility of releasing prerecorded Beta tapes but are consistently turned down by the big studios. This despite a fair amount of loyal Beta users with interest in obtaining new prerecorded fair.

I can remember back in the early eighties that big studios were anxious to get down to one format to release movies on. With RCA pulling the plug on CED and Beta dying a slow death at the hand of VHS, Pioneer was smart enough to create a niche for its' product by vastly improving the quality of the format and fiercely standing behind it; almost alone. With DVD giving laser disc a run for its' money and the number of Beta owners still interested in that format, it will take some creative thinking to bring CED back to life.

While I just have to laugh at the thought of putting out new movies on CED, I have heard that there is at least one professional videotape format that was used decades ago that is now impossible to play as all the machines have broken and irrepairable. I hate the thought of that happening to any format.

Therefore, when I got into CEDs my first worry was having my stylus wear out. It was so much that I started watching only the discs I REALLY wanted to see first, in case the player died and I couldn't watch any more. But I started combing the flea markets and thrift stores and have gotten some spare players, and in cases where the seller will only sell the discs and player as a package, if the player is mono then I take the stylus out of that and store it away in a plastic bag. I also have 2 brand new "old-style" cartridges that I got at a mom-n-pop TV shop, so I don't think I have to worry about my CEDs being unplayable for a long time. I've heard the SJT-series (motorized loading) players had styluses that were designed to last a VERY long time, someone claimed they would last forever with normal use; that's why there's no access cover like on other players, and once you get the player open it's still hard to get to the pickup arm and the stylus. I prefer my SGT-200 however because on "Dual audio" discs it lets me play them in true stereo. "Audio B" was really the out-of-phase sound like how the surround channel in standard Dolby works, so you can get some pretty interesting effects playing these in stereo. The music in Jane Fonda's Workout is recorded weird so you can turn off Jane's voice, and the CBS/FOX discs I have that are English with Spanish on the second track are quite funny in Dolby Surround. The whole Spanish soundtrack of "Snoopy Come Home" is just a microsecond off from the English track so the music echoes strangely if you're playing this in surround, and the dialogue also has an interesting effect- the English voice speaks first then it's like someone sitting behind you starts translating it into Spanish. I've always noticed how "spazzed" Spanish voices in cartoons sound, this is certainly no exception. I laughed when I figured out they were calling Charlie Brown "Carlito", it reminded me of Al Pacino's movie "Carlito's Way". I don't quite think I'm up to handling "North to Alaska" or "The Adventures of Robin Hood" this way yet though.

But back on the subject of keeping equipment alive so the world can always play these, something SHOULD be done to make sure that all CED players becoming unusable never happens. Enthusiasts of old 78 RPM phonographs make needles you can use with those, the CED stylus is a little more complex but I think someone can figure it out. Anyways, I'm off to the flea market at the Drive-in hoping to find some more CEDs! Alan Smithee _____

I have been reading the different opinions about the feasibility of bringing back the CED format. I work in the television industry and I would agree that I can't imagine that there would be any movie companies that would even consider allowing their films to be released on the CED format. It just wouldn't be cost effective for them.

I think talking about releasing new films on CED is alike to longing for audio recording to be released on 8-track. I love both of the formats, but the charm of them is that they are obsolete and so many people consider them junk. That's why it's so fun when you find a nice stash of CED's in a thrift store that hundreds of people have probably walked by and asked, "What the heck are those?" The fact that people are donating these to thrift stores says something about their value to the general public. They are one step away from just being tossed in the garbage can. I do, however, think that forming a company to manufacture new parts for the existing players would be a feasible idea. A small electronics manufacturing company might be very interested in taking on this project for a sales potential of a couple hundred thousand units. I think that's where the efforts should be concentrated, not in bringing back movies on CED. Does anyone out there really want to pay from \$25 to \$35 for a movie released on CED? Got a question for everyone: How many of you, when buying discs, take them out of the covers to check for condition and/or if it's the right movie, or play the first few minutes as soon as you get them? Part of the appeal of my CED collection is that there are literally thousands of hours of material that I have never seen; one of the biggest allures of the format is not being able to see the disc too (just like under normal use you would never see the spool of tape inside an 8-track.) I like to be surprised when I pick out a movie I haven't watched yet and know nothing of what it's about. However, I just ran into a disaster. Going through some of my old VHS tapes recorded off TV, back when I was so poor I had only one VCR and had to tape movies off independent TV stations, I was watching some of the commercials with my closed-captions turned on and a promo for a showing of "Hard Country" came on. What was funny was that the master they were using was captioned, so whatever captions were present in the clips they were showing showed up on the screen. This station always used movies in their original format, unedited (complete with bad language and stuff until they got a ton of complaints; they're now a Fox affiliate) and I'd never seen captions on any of these; so I got out my CED of "Hard Country", which I'd been meaning to watch anyway since it looked like an interesting movie, and it turned out to be disc 2 of "Never Say Never Again!" This was the first time I had gotten the wrong movie when trying to watch one; the only other time was when I had 2 copies of "Arthur" and one of them turned out to have "Game of Death" inside. Here's another "negative" comment, or constructive criticism if you will.

I don't really think it feasable to manufacture the needles as well! For one thing, I can't think of ANY manufacturers making stylii for phonographs let alone CED players (there is definitely a surplus of stylii for phonographs around). For one thing, a CED stylus is NOTHING like a diamond-tipped phonograph stylus. It is many times more complex. It is cut a very specific way in order to let it ride on several grooves unlike a phonograph stylus. Secondly, it has a titanium electrode which extends into the groove. This is much smaller than the diamond tip. There is a connecting wire that is attached to a gold-plated point contact. There are three pieces of magnet used for tracking, and a rubber stabilizer on the back. There is a cylindrical hollow aluminum tube used to hold the needle to the cartridge. There's also a spring used to retract the needle when loading/unloading the cartridge from the player. That's a lot of various parts to assemble! The only other alternative would be to cut down on the number of parts necessary to manufacture by refurbishing cartridges. Even still, it seems rather cost-prohibitive.

The CED FAQ states that, "Note that to date it has been less expensive to buy a working CED player than to buy a new stylus cartridge (my range has been \$5 to \$30 for used players vs. \$45 to \$70 for new stylus cartridges)." Now, if it costs \$45 to \$70 for a new stylus from BACKSTOCK that's at least 10-15 years old...how could it be economically feasable to manufacture a new cartridge (indeed several models of cartridges, since all the different brands use a different style cartridge) for the much reduced user base of today?

Well, here is another topic for discussion for the digest. The bring back the CED campaign is interesting (1.8 million dollars! That would almost pay back my school loans) but perhaps you guys have some thoughts on shipping disks..

Everyone knows that if the disks get stacked too high the sheer weight of the disks can cause the outer case to mash the disk and possibley scratch and damage it right?

But, just because you put the disks 'upright' in a box doesn't really mean anything when you think about it... I asked UPS about 'This side up' and they told me 'no way'... they said the boxes are tossed, rolled down belts, and what not with absolutely no reguard for 'this side up' labels. So, if you have your disks neatly stacked 'up right' they may soon be neatly stacked on top of eachother once the box is turned over.. and since you stacked them all together thinking they are safe, they really aren't.

So - I've been thinking about this... Why not just stack the disks about 4-5 at a time, and then put something to pad the four corners of the disk, and then stack 4-5 more? If you open the case and inspect the amount of space outside the circumfrence of the disk but inside the corner of the outer case you will see it's plenty of space a wad of paper, a piece of styrofoam, etc. Plus the left and ride edges of the disk are solid plastic.

Do you see what I am getting at? The disks can only be crushed in the middle.. so if the outside where there is no disk is padded right then the pressure from a stack of CED's can be distributed to the corners on each stack of five or so disks. Same concept used with those t.v. stands that distribute the weight of the set more towards the edges of you entertainment center so it doesn't bow in the middle.

Anyways, something to think about! I'd like to hear why that will or won't work. Of course, no way to no really know whether it works or not unless you want to take pictures of the disks and record the play quality, ship them to yourself along with a control batch and then re-check to see if there is any damage. But hey, it's fun to theorize right??!

For eleven previous updates I have written about the 'The CED Future'. This time I write to tell you about my discoveries in the finding CED manufacturing systems and hardware. Many have made many suggestions that the public interest corporation, 'Capacitance Corporation' that we have for the project of keeping our system ongoing. Some of the suggestions that were made, were such that our PIC (Public Interest Corporation) offer an electronics company an offer to remanufacture diamond stylus cartridges. I have contacted several electronics companies, such as Digi-Key, whom haven't heard of our cartridges and hence them wouldn't say anything about the possibility of remanufacture.

Amung the other questions that you have asked me through your replies to 'The CED Future' or to your constructive criticism, such as where is the pressing machines that RCA had, or would we go along in the enhancement of our system? I have some answers and suggestions. As for the disc pressing machine which has been put lower on the list of priorities, as I am sure that somewhere in storage at Thomson Consumer Electronics it lies. However I jump to other question about, how can we enhance our obsolete media. >From my personal understanding in the system, the video and sound signals are derived from certain conductors (loosely speaking) in the needle relay the signals to be diciphered. How does this apply to the enhancement of our system? I have a project that I would like all of you to help me with. According to Tom Howe's FAQ on the CED Magic series of pages, that the standard revolutions per minute (RPM) for the RCA CED Player is 450. Others have suggested that since our media is a contact media that it may not sustain a higher number of RPM's. I opt this, that those with broken players and useless stylus cartriges try to increase the RPM number of the turntables by some means or another, load the needle into position. Increase the revolutions per minute until the needle is no longer stable on the disc. In what I mean by stable is that the needle will smoothly ride the groove of the discs. I figure after increasing the RPM's to a certain amount that 10 seconds before instability is reached use that RPM number as the highest stability point. I have done the experiment and have found some promising results. However before I release the results, I'd like you to perform the same experiment if possible during your free time and send me your results as well. After getting at least 5 different results I will publish them in a future edition of the CED Future, or post them in general in CED Digest. It is seriously figured that if the RPM level for the discs can be increased, the playback time of the disc is increased as well as video & sound quality improved.

On to another subject in our quest to improve our nostalgic system. The footwork of improvement. I have read many articles of constructive critisicism on this project. I have read of those who believe that this project is futile, and I have read criticism about those who think that this project is positive and novel. I thank both parties for their constructive criticism, however footwork is what is required. Over the past few weeks I have done several projects and contact several organizations and companies reporting my results, yet haven't gotten any results from those who believed that this is the novel project. I conclude that I must have support either physical or financial from those who also agree with the plans of my project. Support is not your responsibility for this project, yet more promising results in less time would occur if you could offer your support. Again I thank those who have offered your support and I intend to keep you updated as much as possible.

The diamond tip of the CED stylus will probably be the most difficult obstacle to overcome in re-introducing the production of stylus cartridges. Here's a summary of the steps involved in its manufacture:

From natural diamond, prepare .025 x .025 x .2 cm stylus blanks.
 Polish a flat face on the blank for electrode deposition.
 Clean the blank in a hot oxidizing acid bath.
 Rinse in high purity deionized water.
 Atomically clean by baking in a near vacuum at 1300 deg. C.
 Sputter titanium on the polished face in pure argon at a power density of 60,000 watts per square meter.
 Fashion the tip into the proper shape by running it around a keel-lapping disc.
 Cut a 140 degree angle into the tip by running it around another lapping disc.

RCA had to invent the oven in step (5), as no vacuum oven capable of that temperature had ever before been needed. The lapping discs in the last two steps were something like a coarse VideoDisc with a uniform groove, and had their own unique mastering process.

RCA was issued a number of patents regarding stylus design, some of which weren't filed until 1984. These ones will still be valid until 2004, and would presently be owned by GE or Thomson. The full patent descriptions are public documents that will be available at libraries with large government document sections. Here's a listing by patent number:

More description as listed on EBAY:

This is a neat little tool for those who are proud owners of an RCA or compatible CED movie disk player. It was used by technicians to make sure the platter was revolving at the correct speed. There are complete instructions for it's use included. Basically, you remove the cover from player, put in a disk, put the spindle wheel on top of the disk and start it playing. If the wedges on the disk don't move, the disk is spinning at 450 RPM (really fast compared to 33 1/3 ehh?). If they appear to be turning clockwise or counter clockwise then the platter is spinning either too slow or fast. That's basically what it does. A very useful tool for someone still tinkering with an RCA player, or better yet, something neat to go along with your collection even if you aren't a guru of repairing forgotten technology.

Condition: The wheel and instructions are in excellent condition. The envelope they come however has been dog eared and ruffled some as seen in the scan.

Hello All:

I've been asked to question, "How is it possible to record video on Saran Wrap?", which in thicker form was the material used in RCA's early Holotape format. RCA dumped the Holotape format in the development stage in favor of CED for unerasible storage, and MagTape for erasible storage, with MagTape eventually being dumped in favor of VHS. The following article published 28 years ago in _Spectrum_ was recently posted to the Dead Media list, and provides a good explanation of how HoloTape worked:

Source: "Color TV tape player employs lasers and holography" IEEE Spectrum 6 (Dec 1969): page 28

"A laboratory model of a low-cost television color tape player built around lasers and holography and destined for home use in the early 1970s was exhibited recently by RCA. In commercial form, the SelectaVision player, which will be designed to attach to any standard color television set, will play full-color programs recorded on tapes made of the same clear, inexpensive plastic materials used in super-markets to wrap meats.

"These tapes will be scratch proof, rustproof, and virtually indestructible under normal use. The conversion process is described as follows: a color program originating from a color television camera or color videotape player is recorded on conventional film by means of an electron beam recorder. This film, known as the color encoded master, is then developed and convened by a laser to a series of holograms recorded on a plastic tape recorded with photoresist, a material that hardens to varying degrees depending upon the intensity of the light striking it.

"Next, the tape is developed in a chemical solution that eats away the portions of the photoresist not hardened by the laser beam. The result is a relief map of photoresist whose hills and valleys, and the spacing between, represent the original color television program in coded form. This is called the hologram master.

"The hologram master is plated with a thick coating of nickel and stripped away, leaving a nickel tape with the holograms impressed on it like a series of engravings. This is the nickel master.

"Finally, by feeding the nickel master through a set of pressure rollers along with a transparent vinyl tape of similar dimensions, the holographic engravings on the master are impressed on the smooth surface of the vinyl as holographic reliefs. The result is a SelectaVision program tape ready for home use.

"Playback of such a tape requires only that the beam from a very-low-power laser pass through it into a simple, low-cost television camera that sees the images reconstructed by the laser directly, and their colors as coded variations in those images. The playback mechanism, the laser, and the television camera are all housed in the SelectaVision player, which is attached to the antenna terminals of a standard color television set for actual viewing."

BTW have you ever seen the original transfer of "Network"? I have it on both VHS and CED and it's got "SMEAR" written all over it!! So much it's hard to watch the movie! It runs a few minutes over 2 hours, and the currently available laserdisc is on 2 discs (Thanks MGM for having mercy on fans of this movie and re-doing the transfer!) The CED however is a single disc and is time-compressed (master run at slightly faster speed) not only to fit on one disc, but also to make room for 3 "previews" at the end- the only time I've seen previews on a CED movie! For those curious, it has this cheesy music with the words "Also available from MGM/CBS Video" and has what looks like a trailer for a "Wizard of Oz" reissue, and very short spots for "2001" and "Fame", I'm certain "Fame" is a TV commercial but not sure about 2001, it's only about 15 seconds.
